




NHMRC Centre of Research Excellence that aims to

- To reduce <u>mismatches</u> in what gets researched, and what is useful to research
- To avoid <u>waste</u> in research

Results

Survey of priorities for research:

- 138 responses
- 29 themes identified

Ranking Survey to prioritise and condense themes:

- 45 responses
- 22 themes

Attendees included:

- 21 community members
- 8 CCHRN staff
- 3 researchers



Purpose of the consensus workshop



- To discuss, explore and identify issues for research about alcohol consumption during pregnancy and Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder
- The themes from of the survey responses were used to shape the discussion
- Reach a consensus of top 10 priorities for future research





Consensus workshop process



Morning:

- Small group discussion review and discussion of themes
- Whole group discussion sharing feedback from small groups

Afternoon:

- Small group discussion priority setting
- Whole group discussion prioritising and agreeing on final top ten list





Top ten priorities for research



FASD Centre of Research Australia Excellence

Indigenous research priorities:

- 1. National public health campaign/education
- 2. Education about the risks of drinking alcohol during pregnancy in high school
- 3. Mums staying healthy during pregnancy
- Role of immediate, extended family and/or community and being good role models to support women
- 5. Non-judgemental pregnancy support
- 6. Intergenerational trauma
- 7. Understanding why women drink
- 8. Changing society views and beliefs about alcohol use during pregnancy
- Doctors and/or other health professional's knowledge about alcohol in pregnancy
- 10. What is the best/most effective support for those with FASD?

Non-indigenous research priorities:

- Changing society views and beliefs about alcohol use during pregnancy
- Doctor and/or other health professional's knowledge about alcohol in pregnancy
- 3. National public health campaign/education
- 4. Education about the risks of drinking alcohol during pregnancy in high school
- More training in the diagnosis of FASD is required
- 6. Is the workforce appropriately trained to support people with FASD?
- 7. Understanding why women drink
- 8. What is the best/most effective support for those with FASD?
- 9. Non-judgemental pregnancy support
- 10. What support is there for parents and families?
